## DAY 1

Day 1 started with opening remarks from Mr Manisekar Subramaniam, the National Head of HPB Surgery Service. Then the morning session kicked off with 4 papers on various aspects of liver transplantation, discussing from managements to outcomes for its various indications. The interesting selections generated a robust question & answer session.





The subsequent Day 1 papers were focused on malignant topics covering from hepatocellular carcinoma to colorectal liver metastases. Ms Dayang Azzyati's presentation on Himalaya trial on STRIDE regime segued into a lecture by Dr Ang Soo Fan, an oncologist from Penang Adventist Hospital. His topic 'Treatment Decision-Making with Lenvima In Inoperable HCC: Who Are The Right Patients?' comprehensively explored the up-to-date options available for advanced stage hepatocellular carcinoma.

A short break for lunch was followed by another 2 papersand a lecture by AP Koh Peng Soon titled 'Radioembolization or SIRT for HCC: The Surgeon's Role.' The fraternity then gathered for a group photo before visiting the exhibition booths and enjoying the tea break.

Fully embracing the work hard, play hard adage, we concluded the day with dinner at Planters Lounge, Eastern & Oriental Hotel. This special occasion was made possible with the adept organization by Mr Jasjit Singh Nijhar.
